How to Prevent Dengue Md. Moshiur Rahman Registrar



Dengue is a mosquito-borne disease caused by one of any of the four related viruses: Dengue Virus 1, 2, 3, and 4 known as Serotypes. Dengue viruses are spread to people through the bite of an infected female Aedes species. The most common species responsible in transmission of the viruses are *Aedes aegypti* and *Aedes albopictus*. As males do not bite, they cannot transmit diseases. Female mosquitoes, on the other hand, need protein from blood for the development of their eggs. To obtain blood, females seek out and bite hosts such as humans, and may transmit disease in the process. A person can be infected with dengue multiple times in his/her life. A pregnant woman already infected with dengue, can pass the virus to her fetus during pregnancy or around the time of birth.



For well-understanding of mode of infection of dengue in human, we need to know some basic facts about various components of human blood and their functions.

Components of human blood and their functions

The 4 basic components of human blood and their functions, in short, are described below:

- Red Blood Cells (RBCs): Erythrocytes, from Gr. 'Erythros' means 'Red', and 'kytos' means 'Cell', - are cells that carry oxygen to the cells of body. Count: 3.93 to 5.69 million cells per cubic millimeter of blood. Each RBC lives for about 4 months. Hemoglobin is the main ingredients of RBC which plays a vital role in transmitting oxygen to cells of human body in the form of 'oxyhaemogobin'; 12.6 to 17.5 grams per deciliter of blood for male; 12 to 16 grams for females.
- White Blood Cells (WBCs): Leucocytes, from Gr 'Luke' means 'White', and 'kytos' means 'Cell',- are part of the body's immune system. Count: 3,300 to 8,700 cells per cubic millimeter of blood. WBCs help fight infections and diseases, i.e. they play a defensive role in human body.
- 3. Blood Platelets (BP) or Thrombocytes: Thrombocytes derives its name from the term Gr 'Thrombos' meaning a 'thick drop' or 'clot' and 'kytos' means 'Cell', Count:- 1.5 lac to 4.5 lac platelets present in one cubic millimeter of blood. These are cells that help with blood clotting.
- Plasma: Plasma is the liquid portion of blood that plays a key role in transporting blood cells, nutrients, proteins, waste products, and hormones throughout the body.



Functions of blood platelets:

Platelets are small blood cells produced in the bone marrow and circulate in our blood circulatory system. Their primary function is to prevent and stop bleeding, i.e., anti-coagulating function. If a blood vessel is damaged, the body sends signals to platelets which cause them to travel to the injured area of our body and heal them by stopping hemorrhage.

Why do platelets get low in Dengue?

One of the common complications of dengue fever is a decrease in the number of platelets in the blood, which is called 'thrombocytopenia'. The decrease in platelet count in dengue fever is believed to be due to the destruction of platelets by the dengue virus. The virus infects and damages the bone marrow, where platelets are produced, leading to a decrease in their production. Sometimes the immune system may also produce antibodies that attack and destroy platelets.

What happens when platelets are low?

A platelet count of less than 1.5 lac platelets per cubic millimeter (mm3) of blood is lower than normal. The low platelet count in dengue means the inability of the blood to clot

and the inability to fight infections. Bleeding (hemorrhage) can happen inside the body, underneath the skin, or on the surface of skin.

Symptoms of Dengue:

Many people experience no signs or symptoms of a dengue infection. When symptoms do occur, they may be mistaken for other illnesses- such as the flu; usually begin 4 to 10 days after he/she is bitten by an infected Aedes mosquito. Dengue fever causes a high fever-104 degreeF(40 degree C) and any of the following signs and symptoms occur:

Headache; muscle, bone or joint pain; nausea;vomiting; pain behind the eyes; swollen glands, and rash.

Most people recover within a week or so. In some cases, symptoms worsen and can become life-threatening. This is called severe dengue, "dengue hemorrhagic fever" or "dengue shock syndrome". Severe dengue happens when one's blood vessels become damaged and leaky, and the number of platelets in the bloodstream drops. This can lead to shock, internal bleeding, organ failure and even death. The warning signs of "dengue hemorrhagic fever" usually begin after the fever goes away, and may include the following symptoms:

Severe stomach pain, persistent vomiting, bleeding from gums or nose, blood in urine, stools, or vomit, bleeding under the skin, which might look like bruising, difficult or rapid breathing, fatigue, and irritability or restlessness.

How to increase the platelets once it gets low in Dengue?

The platelet count in a dengue patient can be raised by carrying out regular blood transfusions. Besides this, the platelet count can be increased by consuming foods that help boost recovery. This comprises fruits, green leafy vegetables, papaya leaf extract, and foods high in iron, omega-3 fatty acids, vitamin C, vitamin K, vitamin B-12, and related supplements. Healthcare professionals generally recommend the following foods to dengue patients: mangoes, pineapple, papaya, oranges, berries, cauliflower, broccoli, tomato, red & green bell peppers, lentils, pumpkin seeds, dairy products, and eggs.

Prevention of Dengue: What We Should Know!

All four dengue viruses are spread primarily through the bite of an infected species of *Aedes aegypti* and *Aedes albopictus* mosquito. *Aedes aegypti* and *Aedes albopictus* bite during the day and night respectively.

Prevent dengue by avoiding mosquito bites by using the following techniques:

- 1. Stay in air-conditioned or well-screened housing;
- 2. Wear protective clothing (wear the right clothing to protect your skin from mosquito bites)
- 3. Use a mosquito net during sleep both during night and daytime.
- 4. Use mosquito repellent;
- 5. Reduce mosquito habitats.

Vaccine: In areas of the world where dengue fever is common, one dengue fever vaccine (Dengvaxia) is approved for people ages 9 to 45, who have already had dengue fever at least once. The vaccine is given in three doses over the course of 12 months. Remember, in such cases doctors prescriptions must be followed.

Some other techniques are suggested to follow for avoiding mosquito bite; in short those are:

1. Certain colors repel mosquitoes- white, light brown, khaki, pastel yellow, and even soft gray are good options.

It's a finding of a research team of the University of Washington, USA.

- 2. Fragrances, such as perfume, cologne, and scented lotions are a known attractant of mosquitoes. Floral scents are the biggest attraction for mosquitoes. It turns out those lady mosquitoes love a flowery fragrance. So, when you're addressing the issue of body odor, be sure to avoid washing with fragranced body wash.
- Washing with soap was shown to alter a person's odor profile, making them more or less attractive to mosquitoes. To make yourself less attractive to mosquitoes, you can use mosquito-repellant products namely- picaridin, citronella, lemon, and eucalyptus.

Glorious Journey of Fareast International University (FIU)

Fareast International University got approval from the Ministry of Education on September 15, 2013, and in the same year October 6, received approval from the University Grants Commission (UGC) of Bangladesh. The first main campus of FIU was at House-50, Road-11, Block-C, Banani, and the laboratory building was at House No. 19, Road No.-07, Block-F, Banani Dhaka. At present, there are 20 UGC approved programs for undergraduate and postgraduate students. We have five faculties, including - Faculty of Business Administration, Faculty of Engineering, Faculty of Science, Faculty of Liberal Arts and Social Science, and Faculty of Law. Fareast International University is established by a few education enthusiasts. The aim of Fareast International University is to make it well known in the higher education arena following a high-quality education institution and student friendly academic environment through the tireless efforts of experienced teachers and staff.

Within 4 (four) years of its establishment, the Board of Trustees of Fareast International University purchased approximately 2 acres of land in Sector 16/I, Uttara, Dhaka (Plot No. 1, 2, Road No. 1 & 2) to build a permanent campus by utilizing its own fund. The drawing and design of the university building have already been approved by RAJUK. The university authority is determined to start academic and administrative activities in the permanent campus in Uttara within this year.

This university has been conducting educational activities with a very good reputation since its inception. The 1st convocation ceremony of the university was held on January 23, 2020, at the Bangladesh China Friendship Conference Center (BCFCC) presided over by the Honorable President and Chancellor of the People's Republic of Bangladesh.

The Chief Justice of Bangladesh, Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain, graced the event by attending as the convocation speaker. This is a very memorable event in the history of private universities. In the convocation ceremony, the Honorable President and Chancellor conferred degrees to a

total of 1620 students are graduated at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels. No private university in the history of Bangladesh has been able to hold a convocation ceremony in such a short time of establishment. The Fareast International University has been able to organize its first convocation within 6 (six) years of its establishment for the good management and the tireless efforts of experienced teachers and administrative staffs. As a reputed private university, our many meritorious students were able to pursue higher education abroad with scholarships.

Along with education and research, the teachers and students of Fareast International University have been involved in extracurricular activities such as sports, debate competitions, blood donation camps, and various community activities. The FIU football team has achieved the honor of qualifying for the finals 9 times and becoming champions 5 times at the inter-university level, including the Faraz Gold Cup in 2018 and the BSL Inter-University Futsal Championship in 2024. In addition, it has also earned a reputation by participating in national debate competitions. Every year, the Blood Donation Club has been organizing free camps. The Art of Understanding Human Behavior Fariha Tabassum Lecturer



As a valuable ability, it helps to penetrate one step further than verbal communication to understand somebody's thinking. The myriads of emotions and actions coupled with unconscious signals that emerge from human behavior convey much more depth than most people typically recognize. Human behavior serves as an emotional and mental reflection that communicates more effectively than spoken words. communication Relationships together with and decision-making perform better when people learn to recognize subconscious nonverbal messages. Patrick King in his book Read People Like a Book declared that "Human behavior is a reflection of the mind and emotions, often more telling than any words can convey."

Body language stands as a key indicator which reveals important information during human social exchanges. King stresses that the human body serves as an honest messenger because it never develops fake displays. He said, "People may lie, but their body never does." People inevitably show their real emotions through the way they stand, the way their face looks, and the movements of their eyes. Crossed arms combined with eye averts typically expresses defensive feelings but a smile that reaches the eyes stands as a genuine sign of happiness. According to King, "A simple gesture can tell you more than an hour of conversation." As Albert Mehrabian, author of *Silent Messages*, famously stated, "The most important thing in communication is hearing what isn't said."

Human emotional intelligence serves as the key factor that enables persons' psychological comprehension beyond simple physical movements. Patrick King explains how to understand

people through more than their direct statements when their implied expressions are also considered. The complete meaning behind communication emerges through the tone of voice selected words and periods of unspoken moments during speech. According to Kings, "The key to understanding people is not just in what they say, but in what they don't say." True feelings are frequently communicated ndirectly—through tone of voice, choice of words, or even pauses in speech. "The unspoken is often the most powerful part of any conversation". The observation of subtle signs enables someone to form better responses that generate deeper meaningful relationships. In his book Blink Malcolm Gladwell writes, "The key to good decision-making is not knowledge. It is understanding. We are swimming in knowledge, but we are starved for understanding." Goleman describes empathy as the combination of listening to others creating space and refraining from judgment which enables emotional connection and delivers the healing concept of shared feelings of loneliness.

Human behavior alongside thinking patterns influences the responses that appear in different situations. King demonstrates to his readers that people display predictable human behavior because their current behaviors predict what they will do next. Human minds make choices through the amalgamation of past events paired with cultural factors along with personal preference bias though they may not detect the way these elements shape the results.

Reading human behavior represents a therapeutic skill that enables true understanding between people rather than any form of manipulation. People reveal their true selves through actions rather than words according to the advice of Patrick King from *Read People Like a Book*. According to him, "Behavior is the key to unlocking someone's intentions, not just their words." He added, "To truly understand someone, observe what they do, not just what they say". Observing these silent voices yet forceful signals allows people to establish authentic connections through better communication. Stephen Covey published The 7 *Habits of Highly Effective People* where he stated "Seek first to understand, then to be understood."

The true nature of people reveals itself beyond deceptive words when we evaluate their actions together with their expressed emotions. King states that relationships grow stronger when observation methods increase the amount of understanding people. Behavior reveals everything about us because words frequently conceal the truth according to King. He states, "The more observation takes place, the greater the understanding—and the stronger relationships become." He reminds us, "Words can deceive, but behavior speaks the truth." As Maya Angelou famously said, "I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel."

In Protest against Sexual Harassment Wakibur Rahman Sujan

Even though there are strict laws, yet sexual harassment is a growing problem in our country now. The increase on the number of such cases is alarming and is a threat to the society. According to Bangladesh Ain o Salish Kendra, in the first two months of 2025, 294 women were sexually harassed of whom 44 girls were below 18. If we look back, according to Human Rights Support Society(HRSS) between 2020-2024, at least 11758 women were sexually harassed, 6305 of them being raped and 3,471 of these rape victims are under 18 (8 march 2025, the Daily Star). It is all the more shocking that a lot of victims don't even report to Police Station due to the fear of social shame.

In Bangladesh, the Women and Children Repression Prevention Act 2000 includes the death penalty as the highest punishment but cases take a very long time. Therefore the victims feel pressure from society and don't make a report out of fear. Moreover, the complexity of fighting the case and its lengthy process are also among the reasons for which the victims and their families do not report.

As a solution to this problem, a separate fast judicial court could be set up, where the deadline for investigation reports could be set for maximum 15 days and the deadline for execution of the verdict could be set within 60 days. The name and photos of convicted could be displayed on a huge digital billboard in front of the Supreme Court. Like in many Muslim countries, if the criminal is hanged in front of the Supreme Court, people will be scared of committing crimes. Besides legal actions, society must raise awareness and support the victims. Students, teachers, imams, priests, local politicians, chairmen, and members should also work together to make people aware. Everyone must unite in educational institutions, workplaces, and government offices to fight against this heinous crime. Above all, the government should also be careful while amending laws to ensure justice and prevent misuse of sensitive laws.
